As Lwengo Kids Foundation, we would like to update you again. The corona problem is seriously troubling us. We have temporarily stopped the pub quizzes and the herring party has been canceled. As a result, we miss out on income and we cannot, for example, continue to roll out the pig and goat project. Unfortunately we have not been in Lwengo since February. Fortunately, the work continues. Anthony and his staff visited the 35 new sponsor children for us. The reports of those visits were sent by Marga to the sponsors. The school is still closed. The teaching staff and the team are working hard to prevent learning disadvantages as much as possible and schoolwork is delivered to the home as much as possible. You can read how this works in Marga's contribution.

The tax authorities have checked our ANBI status and have complimented us. That gives confidence.

You indicated during the sponsor evening that you have a lot of confidence in us. The small scale and personal involvement of us through the working visits to Uganda also appeals to you. In order to continue in this way, we have decided to sponsor a maximum of 250 children. The counter now stands at 206, so do not hesitate to call on people in your network to give more children a chance at education. Heartily recommended. No, because the goal of Lwengo Kids Foundation is that we continue to help these young people until they have learned a trade to provide for their own existence. That's what we do it for, with you and because these children are more than worth it!

Money is needed for this because a place at Secondary School is simply a bit more expensive than Primary School.

All sponsor parents with children in Primary 7 will receive a letter from us in October with all the information about the transition from Primary to Secondary School.

We were able to transfer more than € 7,500 to Lwengo. Food packages were bought for this and distributed to the locals! How happy the people were!

Progress dormitory

The construction of the dormitories for the children and the teachers' residence is almost complete. Now the finish and the furnishings. We are working on the bunk beds and with a number of donations we have been able to ensure that good mattresses and mosquito nets are also supplied. Normally the children have to provide a mattress themselves. But often there is no money for this and the children sleep on a bad foam rubber layer, with all the unpleasant consequences that entails. That is why we have decided to provide mattresses and mosquito nets for all children. As a finishing touch, the foundation provides them with four large picnic tables for the porches, where they can eat, but where there is also a place to do homework or just socialize.
